Example of lessons learnt: Understanding Perspectives

In our seminar, we had projects to further understand the theories learnt through textbooks/classes. In the process of accomplishing the projects, we needed to do some interviews to gain direct knowledge and examples. For one of the first projects, we contacted 50 companies - but with zero success. Going 0/50 clearly meant we were at fault and worked to improve the process of getting successful appointments for interviews.

The main improvements were: 1) Collaborating with the other team within the seminar, 2) Shortening the length of the E-mails, 3) Making the interview shorter. These improvements were made because we realized that our interviews were too costly for the interviewee, especially in terms of time. These improvements led to success in a later project, where we were able to interview a total of 12 companies.

SELF PR / STRENGTHS

One of my main strengths is **not giving up**.

I studied abroad at Harvard Summer School, which was mainly targeted towards graduate students, with most of them being working adults. This meant that I was severely lacking in knowledge and experience, compared to my peers. However, I had no intent of leaving the class – which had me thinking, *there must be some value that I can bring* to the team and class. In order to make up for my shortcomings, I looked for the advantages that I hadn't noticed myself. This was accomplished by communicating with my presentation team members effectively, through what I've learned on intercultural communication. My main strengths turned out to be my active listening and fresh ideas.

In the end, I was able to make major contributions to the class and presentation, leading to the "A" grade I received. This episode is why I believe "not giving up" or my endurance through tough times - is one of my strengths.
